2. Jacob ${ }^{1}$ Altorffer. Born, Apr 1537. Died, 31 Mar 1585, in Kloten, Canton Zurich, Switzerland ${ }^{2}$. Baptism: 18 Apr 1537, in Ruti, Kloten, Canton Zurich, Switzerland ${ }^{2}$. Occupation: Farmer.
"Jacob Altorfer (Altorffer) born Ruti, baptized 18 April 1537. Presumably the son of Reudi Altorfer. Jacob was a farmer and apparently moved from Ruti to the larger town of Kloten where he held the honorable office of Lt. Gov. (for Kyburg) from 1570 to 1582 , possibly until his death in Kloten, 31 March 1585, aged 48 years. This was the highest office a citizen of Zurich could receive.
"Lt. Gov. Jacob Altorfer took office and presided over the court at Bassersdorf 'at the request' of Mathysen Schwertzenbach, who was governor of Kyburg during that period.
"Jacob owned a valuable farm and several other properties. He was married two or possibly three times. He married first presumably before Dec. 1556, Verena, last name unknown; a few months later she is called 'Walpurga' in the records. It is not possible to determine because of the lack of documentation, to whom and how many times Jacob Altorfer was married. He married 1 Dec 1584 (shortly before his death which occurred four months later) Elsbeth Kaller (Keller) of Kloten." Four children (known only from first marriage). Alderfers of America, Helen Alderfer Stanley, (1972), p. 12.

"Hans Altorfer, baptized Kloten, Sunday, 15 August 1568, died 23 Nov 1615, aged 47 years. The son of Lt. Gov. Jacob Altorfer and his wife. His godfather was Johannes Buwman, clergyman (at Kloten); godmother, Agnes Fry, (Frei).
"Hans Altorfer married 2 Dec 1593, Anna Schmidin (Schmid) of Kloten. She died after 1634, presumably at Bassersdorf. Their marriage is entered in the parish register for Kloten. She was the daughter of Conrad Schmid. Her brother Felix Schmid was schoolmaster at Bassersdorf.
"Hans Altorfer was a farmer, he owned several farms and served as Lt. Gov. as did his father, and later his son. According to the entry in the council manual (Minor Council of the City of Zurich) of 8 May 1609, Hans Altorfer was elected to the office of the (sub)-domain (Kloten) of the County Kyburg. His homestead in Kloten afterward belonged to his son. No children are recorded before 1599." [Two children listed.] Alderfers of America, by Helen Alderfer Stanley, (1972), pp. 12-13.

## RELIGIOUS TURMOIL

"From earliest times there had been differences of opinion among Christians -- differences as to doctrine and church organization. One of these differences involved a schism in the llth century between the Christians who used the Greek language and those who used the Latin. This resulted early in two separate churches: (1) Orthodox church of the East, and (2) Catholic church of the West. Both claimed to be Orthodox and both claimed to be Catholic.
"Kings and other civil rulers resented the political power and influence of the Church. Then too there was another kind of disagreement derived from the religious teaching of the day. In the 14 th century John Wyclif (1320-1384), an English priest, and professor in the University of Oxford, took decided issue with numerous Catholic teachings and practices. Primarily he declared that the Pope was not Christ's representative on earth, and that individual Christians should be guided by what they read in the Bible, and that the church should be subordinate to the state. There were grave abuses in the church and there was widespread demand for reform.
"The first reformer to lead a large number of people in western Europe to break openly with the Catholic Church was Martin Luther (1483-1546). He was a native German who became a monk at twenty-two, and was a professor of theology in the University of Wittenberg. As a teacher and preacher he was popular with the students. In 1517 several agents of Pope Leo $X$ were sent out to collect money to finish St. Peter's Church in Rome. Aroused by one of these agents named Tetzel, Luther posted on the church door at Wittenberg 95 theses, which he offered to debate all comers. Luther denied that a pope or church council had any divine authority to interpret Christ's teachings. Luther was excommunicated from the Catholic Church almost immediately, and then he proceeded to flood Germany with pamphlets in which he violently attacked both the Pope and the Catholic Church. (Many Cassels lived in and about Wittenberg, and knew Martin Luther personally. They were much influened by him.)
"This was the beginning of the REFORMATION and the Thirty Year War (1618-1648) one of the bloodiest in history, and where maybe as many as half of the population were killed in the area. It was this religious turmoil and the Thirty Year War that were responsible for Cassel family members deciding to leave Germany for the United States. From the REFORMATION came many different sects of the newly emerging Protestant faith. This included Lutheranism, Anglicanism, Calvanism, and Presbyterianism among others.
"The Society of Jesus represented the initial movement characterized as a COUNTER-REFORMATION, and represented a movement within the Catholic Church.

Ignatius Loyola was a Spanish soldier. While in the hospital suffering from wounds he read about the life of Christ, and decided to become a knight of Christ. He founded the Jesuit order in 1534. In the first place they founded many schools and rested their case largely on improved education, and their wide learning and culture won back a considerable respect for the Catholic cause.
"The QUIETIST and PIETIST movement was a third and distinct aspect of the break between the Catholics and Protestants, and with the Pietist faith representing a COUNTER-COUNTER movement. It was in this part of the REFORMATION that Yelles (Julius) Cassel (1590-1681) played an important and critical role in Germany.
"He was a poet of some renown who resided in Kriesheim, in the Palatinate, Germany, and later became a humble Mennonite preacher. The sinking of the great Spanish Armada in the North Sea by a huge storm, convinced Yelles Kassel that if God is on your side, the greatest naval armada in the world could not even touch your soil; for the Spanish Armada had sought to capture England for Spain. The poems of Yelles Kassel clearly depict this philosophy." Cassel Family Roots, by Russell N. Cassel and Milford H. Cassel, (Chula Vista, CA: Private printing, 1978), pp. 4-5.
"William Penn made his first visit to Germany in 1671 as a missionary, stopping at Emden, Crefield, and West Phalia. His second visit was in 1677, when he was 33 years of age, but he was not as yet, known as the founder of Penn's Woods, or Pennsylvania in the Uniced States. Then, in 1681, he made the third and most important visit, and gave notice of a meeting from the city of Kassel at Frankford. From Frankford he went to Kresheim, where he arrived 23 August 1681 , intending to preach at a previously announced meeting as requested by the Calvinist minister. However, all preaching was forbidden by the Bailiff Sheriff Deputy, and a secret meeting was convened, instead. Yelles Kassel and members of his family traveled from Worms, Germany, by wagon to attend the silent meeting.
"Count Karl Ludwig gave Penn permission to hold a religious meeting in Kresheim on Sunday, 26 August 1681, and Penn traveled on foot the six miles from Worms to Kresheim for that meeting. The meeting was held in a barn, and Count Ludwig stood behind a door to witness the nature of the meeting, and Penn did not know he was present. Ludwig reported to the Calvanist minister that nothing heretical occured, and all that he heard was actually very good. Penn preached in the German language, which he learned from his mother -- she was a Dutch woman from Rotterdam. His discourse emphasized the need for greater religious freedom, and indicated where such freedom was lacking. He told examples of people in the community being driven from one place to another, and with their property confiscated. Yelles Kassel was one of the examples, where for more than a decade he was largely living in hiding and in secret with his family.
"Penn explained his religious belief in detail, and emphasizing the pietist faith that corresponds very nearly with that of the Mennonite and Quaker religions of today. Yelles Kassel and several of his sons were present along with other Kassels. All of the Kassels were members of the newly emerging Mennonite church. The Kassels were so pleased with Penn's remarks that as soon as the meeting was over they invited Penn to their home, where they discussed in detail matters of religion.
"Penn told them of a tract of land in the United States given by King

Charles III. He informed the Kassels that they could have free land if they wanted to come to America and settle there, where they would be granted religious freedom.
"Two sons of Yelles Kassel of Kresheim, Germany were the first Cassels to come to America under the terms of a promise by William Penn. They were Johannes Cassel (1639-1691), with his wife, Mary, and Arnold Cassel (1642-1687). They arrived in Germantown, Pennsylvania on 20 November, 1686. They came on the ship Jeffries. It took seven months to make the journey.
"Shortly after arriving in Germantown, Johannes Cassel learned that a large legacy was left his family, through the death of a relative, which amounted to nearly one million dollars. It was necessary for them to return to Germany to claim the legacy. A church council was called, and the matter was freely discussed. It was decided, however, by a unanimous vote not to receive the money, as it would have a tendency to make them proud, which was at odds with their religious beliefs.
"Johannes was 47 years old when he immigrated to America. They had five children who accompanied them to the new land... [listed]. He signed the original charter of Germantown, Pennsylvania, where he settled and spent the rest of his natural live. He died 17 April 1691.
"For a couple of years Arnold lived with his brother in Germantown, where he received his naturalization papers in 1691. He then set out for free land in the western part of Pennsylvania, in what is believed to be in the area that is now Pittsburgh. It was rumored that he was killed by the Indians, and nothing more was heard from him." Cassel Family Roots, pp. 14-15.

He was a successful farmer, and in addition village magistrate and justice of the county Kyburg; Ehgaumer (official of the marriage bureau and ethical life of the parish). He served as

Vorfahnrich (ensign) under Squire Hans Friedrich von Waldkirch, of the castle Kyburg, in the 'Rohr,' the castle was situated south-west of Kloten near the 'Glatt. '
"Jacob Altorfer married 10 May 1623, Verena Magg (Maagin) of Bachenbulach. (Note the 'in' when added to the name denotes the feminine ending in German.) She was the daughter of Uoli Maag and wife Margaretha Maag. Verena Maag brought about 2600 gulden of parental funds to the marriage. As guarantee, her husband, Jacob Altorfer, signed his ancestral farm and homestead over to her, as security,.... In addition, Jacob Altorfer signed over two other farms in order to insure the large sum of money adequately...." Twelve children. Alderfers of America, by Helen Alderfer Stanley, (1972), pp. 13-14.

8. Abraham ${ }^{4}$ Cassel (Yelles (Julius Cassel), 5). Born, 1644, in Kriesheim, Baden, Germany ${ }^{8}$. Died, 1704, in Germany ${ }^{8}$.
"The second immigration of the Cassel family to America was made by Hubert Cassel, son of Abraham Cassel, and grandson of Yelles Kassel of Kresheim, Germany. He arrived in Germantown, Pennsylvania in 1729 [sic] (compiler: elsewhere, 1720), and later moved to Skippack Township, Montgomery County, Pennsylvania, about a dozen miles generally west of Philadelphia. He was a single man and hired his services as a husbandman and weaver -- initially in the Germantown area. He became acquainted with a Dutch girl, Seythe, a native of Holland, with whom he was united in marriage. In the meantime his brothers in Germany charged him with the most solemn remonstrances not to marry any Dutch girl. After this marriage he purchased 150 acres of land...."
"Two brothers of Hubert, sons of Abraham, and grandsons of Yelles Kassel, were the third Cassel members to immigrate to America. They came on the ship friendship, of Bristol. John Davis was Master of Ship. It sailed from Rotterdam 20 June. It landed at Germantown 16 Oct 1727 , a journey of four months. "Moving from Switzerland to Steinsfurt in the Kraichgau district of Germany occured in the wake of Swiss emigration into the regions desolated by the Thirty Years War. But what were the motivating reasons which caused Hans Altorfer, our Frederick's grandfather, to give up his ancestral home in Kloten and at the age of 38 move to Germany?
"Existing documents give us a fairly clear but one-sided account of what appears to have been a family difference over property rights which undoubtedly stirred strong feelings of resentment on both sides. Hans held the parental estate on the village street in Kloten that he cultivated in the name of his elder brother, Jacob, and his four sisters, which means each owned a share. On February 5, 1679, Hans Altorfer had to justify himself before the court before his brothers-in-law Jacob Hindermeister and Felix Schmid over the sum of the 'adjustment', that is, the rights of his two married sisters in the parental estate. It seems that he no longer was willing to provide so much for his brother and sisters and receive only the heretofore agreed sum of 40 gulden ( 80 pounds) as his share from the estate. Therefore, to set the real value of the entire landed property the court made an evaluation, whereby house and orchard were set with a half yoke of vines at 1,000 gulden, $3-1 / 2$ yokes of meadowland 450 gulden, 6 yokes of woodland (forest) 225 gulden along with animals and wagons, namely 2 horses, 2 cows, one steer, 200 gulden. The final value was fixed at 2,455 gulden. From this, however, were to be substracted as debts

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2,268 gulden and 3 gulden court costs, so that final active value of 184 gulden remained. What happened in the next two weeks can only be surmised. On the 20 of February 1679 the Kyburg court assembled again and were faced with the fact that Hans Alterfer had taken matters into his own hands and with his servant, Heinrich Flachsmann, left the country, undoubtedly as a result of his quarrel with his brother and sisters. Hans Altorfer apparently must have taken along about 600 pounds, or 300 gulden in cash, which he felt rightfully belonged to him. The usual $10 \%$, or 60 pounds, moving tax had not been turned over to the Swiss court. The court decided to have the entire property auctioned off at a bankruptcy action. As agent for this, as well as lawyer to protect the rights of Han's wife and children, the court appointed Jacob Ochsner of Kloten. The court placed an additional 100 pounds ( 50 gulden) fine on the estate to cover the process. On August 28,1679 Judge Ochsner sold the Alderfer property for the grand sum of 3,600 gulden to Hans Heinrich Gassman of Oberhori (community Hori, church Bulach). This sale cleared the estate and left 950 gulden to be divided among Hans's brother and sisters.
"By 1680 Hans Altorfer was a citizen and farmer in Steinsfurt in the Upper Palatinate. His wife (Elsbeth Fretz) and their children remained in Kloten and were provided for out of the estate for three years before they were able to join him in Steinsfurt, Germany.
"This once fertile region of hilly country delightfully situated in the Upper Pflatz between the plains of the Rhine and Neckar, a land of rich vineyards and farms, was completely devasted at the end of the Thirty Years War. This was the Electoral Palatinate which thanks to the Elector Frederick had slowly begun to recover then it was again devastated and burned to the ground by the French. The Elector's imperial troops were defeated in 1674 in the Sinsheimer battle near Steinsfurt. The area was slowly repopulated by the Swiss, but clouds of war again gathered. In 1689, along with other cities of the Palatinate, all the country towns and villages of the Kraichgau including Steinsfurt were overrun and burned to the ground. It is said not a house remained, and the survivors experienced indescribable suffering for lack of every human need. Undoubtedly Hans Altorfer's family lost everything and experienced much hardship, although very little is known of them during that period.
"The parish books of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Steinsfurt were preserved and are kept today in the parsonage of the church at Karlsruhe, Germany. There is no longer a Lutheran church at Steinsfurt." Alderfers of America, by Helen Alderfer Stanley, (1972) pp. 17-18. Ten children.

"Dielman Kolb was born November 10, 1691, in the afternoon, at one o'clock. He married Elizabeth Schnebli, Anno, 1714, on St. Jacob's day, in the 23rd year of his age.
"Anno, 1717, on the 21st of March, they left Ibersheim, in the Palatinate, for Pennsylvania, where they safely arrived on the 10 th of August, 1717, at Philadelphia. He came about ten years later than his brothers Martin, Jacob, Henry and Johannes. He lived in Mannheim, where he attended as a preacher of the Mennonite congregation, and making himself most valuable and useful by receiving and lodging his fellow believers, who fled from Switzerland on account of their religious belief, as appears from a letter dated August 27, 1710. He subsequently emigrated to Pennsylvania, where he, in connection with Heinrich Funk, supervised the translation of Van Braght's 'Martyrs' Mirror' from the Dutch into the German language, and certified to its correctness. The great difficulty was to find a trustworthy translator and a printer in the forests of Pennsylvania who could undertake the expense of a publication of such magnitude. Naturally they had concluded to apply to the older and wealthier churches in Europe, and on the 19 th of October, 1745, Jacob Godshall, of Germantown, Dillman Kolb of Salford, Michael Ziegler, Yelles Kassel and Martin Kolb of Skippack, and Heinrich Funk, of Indian Creek, sent a letter to Amsterdam on the subject, applying for aid. Finally the book was printed at Ephrata, Lancaster County, PA, without any aid from the old country. The first part was completed in 1748, and the second part in 1749 , the whole containing about 1500 pages, and took fifteen men three years to finish it.
"Dielman Kolb was a Mennonite minister, and was instrumental in organizing the Mennonite congregation in Salford, Montgomery County, PA, in the year 1738. He was one of a committee to arrange and supervise the translation of the 'Martyrs' Mirror' from the Dutch to the German language. Through his influence Christopher Dock was induced to write his 'Theory and Practice of Teaching,' the first ever written in America as far as known, which was afterwards printed by Christopher Saur, at Germantown. His will is dated July 8, 1748, and probated April 30, 1757, and is recorded at Norristown, Montgomery Co. PA. A Genealogical History of the Kolb, Kulp or Culp Family, by Daniel Kolb Cassel, pp. 484-485.

The previously mentioned book continues with a lengthy quotation attributed to "the Hon. S.W. Pennypacker, of Philadelphia." The early paragraph chronicals the same information above. This compiler wants to record more details (from S.W. Pennypacker) regarding translation of Van Braght's "Martyrs' Mirror."
"This book is the great historical work of the Mennonites, and the most durable monument of that denomination. It traces the history of those Christians who, from the time of the Apostles, were opposed to the baptism of infants and to warfare, including the Lyonists, Petrobusians and Waldenses; details the persecution of the Mennonites by the Spaniards in the Netherlands and the Calvinists in Switzerland, together with the individual sufferings of many hundreds who were burned, drowned, beheaded, or otherwise maltreated; and contains the confessions of faith adopted by the different communities.
"Many copies of the book were brought to America, but they were in Dutch. No German translation existed, and much the larger proportion of those here who were interested in it could read only that language. It was not long before a

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desire for a German edition was manifested, and the declaration of a war between England and France in 1744, which, in the nature of things, must involve, sooner or later, their colonies in America, made the Mennonites fearful that their principles of non-resistance would be again put to the test, and anxious that all of the members, expecially the young, should be braced for the struggle by reading of the steadfastness of their forefathers amid sufferings abroad. Their unsalaried preachers were, however, like the members of the flock--farmers who earned their bread by tilling the soil--and were ill-fitted, both by circumstances and education, for so great a literary labor. Where could a trustworthy translator be found? Where was the printer in the forests of Pennsylvania who could undertake the expense of a publication of such magnitude? Naturally, they had recourse to the older and wealthier churches in Europe, and on the 19 th of October 1745, Jacob Godshalk, of Germantown, Dielman Kolb, of Salford, Michael Ziegler, Yilles [sic] Kassel, and Martin Kolb, of Skippack, and Heinrich Funk, of Indian Creek, author of two religious works published in Pennsylvania, wrote, under instruction from the various communities, a letter to Amsterdam on the subject. They say:
'Since according to appearances the flames of war are mounting higher, and it cannot be known whether the cross and persecution may not come upon the defenceless Christians, it becomes us to strengthen ourselves for such circumstances with patience and endurance, and to make every preparation for steadfast constancy in our faith. It was, therefore, unanimously considered good in this community, if it could be done, to have the Bloedig Toneel of Dielman Jans Van Braght translated into the German language, especially since, in our communities in this country, there has been a great increase of young men who have grown up. In this book posterity can see the traces of those faithful witnesses who have walked in the way of truth and given up their lives for it.'
"At Ephrata, in Lancaster County, had been established some years before, and still exists, a community of mystical Dunkers, who practiced celibacy, and held their lands and goods in common. About 1745 they secured a hand printing press, now in possession of the Historical Society of Pennsylvania, on which they printed over fifty books, which are among the scarcest and most sought after of American imprints. The chronicle of the cloister says:
'Shortly before the time that the mill was burned down, the Mennonites in
Pennsylvania united together to have their great martyr book, which was in the Dutch language, translated and printed in German. For this work there was nobody in the whole country considered better fitted than the brotherhood in Ephrata, since they had a new printing office and paper mill, and moreover, could place hands enough upon the work. After the building of the mill was completed, the printing of the martyr book was taken in hand, for which important work fifteen brethren were selected, of whom nine had their task in the printing office, viz: a corrector, who was also translator, four compositors and four pressmen; the others worked in the paper mill. Three years were spent upon this book, but the work was not continuous, because of the supply of paper was deficient. And since in the meantime there was very little other business on hand, the brethren got deeply into debt, but through the great demand for the book this was soon liquidated. It was printed in large folio, using sixteen quires of paper, and making an edition of thirteen hundred copies. In a council held with the Mennonites, the price for a single

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copy was fixed at twenty shillings, from which it can be seen that the reasons for printing it were very different from a hope of profit. That this martyr book was a cause of many trials to the recluses, and added not a little to their spiritual martyrdom, is still in fresh remembrance.'
"In this rather remarkable way have been fortunately preserved the particulars concerning the publication of the Ephrata martyr book.
"The publication of the first part was completed in 1748 , and the second in 1749. It is a massive folio of fifteen hundred and twelve pages.
"The before-mentioned Heinrich Funk and Dielman Kolb were appointed a committee by the Mennonites to make the arrangement with the community at Ephrata, and to supervise the translation. Their certificate is appended, saying: 'It was desired by very many in Pennsylvania that there should be a German translation and edition of the martyr book of the defenceless Christians or Tauffs-gesinnten, before printed in the Dutch language.
"Heinrich Funk and Dielman Kolb had such a great love for this book that they both, with common consent, gave their time and labor to it; and as the sheets came from the press and were sent to them in their order, went over them one at a time, comparing them with the Dutch; and in this work have not omitted a single verse." A Genealogical History of the Kolb, Kulp or Culp Family, by Daniel Kolb Cassel, pp. 486-488.

"The first immigrants of record were Ulrich and Peter Zug Imported in the Ship "James Goodwin," David Crockatt, Master, from Rotterdam, September 27, 1727.' The fifty-three families on board were described as Palatines in the minutes of the Provincial Council, although this designation was commonly applied to all German speaking immigrants regardless of their place of origin.

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Michael Zug states that Ulrich was a native of Canton Zug, Switzerland, but this association is surely incorrect as noted in Chapter One. No evidence has been found for the tradition that Peter and Ulrich were brothers. Peter's name follows immediately that of Ulrich on the captain's list and on the oath of allegiance, which suggests that the two families were traveling together. However, they eventually located along different fringes of the settled portion of Pennsylvania, Peter about forty miles north of Philadelphia in Bucks County and Ulrich seventy miles northwest in Lancaster County.
"We are fortunate that the captain of the 'James Goodwill' was one of two captains who listed the size of each family. Occasionally a captain recorded the number of 'freights,' children being counted as 'half freights,' but the record for this crossing states, 'Number in the Family.' The families of Peter and Ulrich each numbered four persons; from this we assume that each was accompanied by a wife and two children. Family records have not been found to confirm these numbers by birth dates or to determine which children were born in Europe. Ulrich's family Bible, printed 1712 in Basel, Switzerland, contains no record of any kind.
"Ulrich's first years in this country have not been documented. According to family tradition, he and his wife came to the home of the latter's brother, Michael Bachman, who had immigrated in 1712 and settled near Manheim, Lancaster Co., PA. Ulrich was said to have been at one time the owner and resident of a farm near Lititz where his son Christian later lived. Although 'Woolrick Soak' was a warantee on 25 November 1735 for 250 acres on a branch of the Chickaselunga (Chickies) Creek, this land was patented by Michael Bachman in 1742. Michael was warantee and patentee for several large tracts totaling more than 1,000 acres in northern Lancaster County. Ulrich purchased 345 acres from Michael on 20 July 1743 for 60 pounds and 'one ear of Indian corn for every 100 acres to be delivered in Lancaster on November 1 for said Bachman yearly to the proprietors forever.' The corn apparently was in lieu of the annual quit rent, usually a few pence, exacted by the Penns on each land grant and passed on by deeds to subsequent owners.
"After fifteen years in this country, Ulrich and his wife united with the White Oak Congregation of the German Baptist Brethren. Barbara was baptized in 1741 and Ulrich in 1742. Prior to that time they were believed to have been Mennonites, although evidence for this association is lacking. Their daughter Magdalena and sons Peter, Johannes, Michael, Jacob, and Christian were baptized by the Brethren from 1747 to 1769 , but daughter Christiana, who married John Musselman at age fourteen, joined the Mennonites.
"While Ulrich and son Hans were clearing a tract of woodland, Hans remarked that he might take a wife. His father asked whether he had someone in mind, and Hans said, 'Yes, Sister Anna Heffelfinger.' To this his father replied, 'All right, I will tell the deacons, that they go and ask her whether she will have you.' The story has been told to illustrate early betrothal customs, but in this case, the incident likely was remembered as a father's handling of a conversation with his young son, both realizing that a marriage would be years away. Hans was but sixteen years of age when his father died. The date of the eventual marriage is unknown, although the first child was not born until 1757, a decade after Ulrich's death.
"Ulrich died intestate in early 1748. The inventory by Barbara Zouck, Administratrix, was filed 11 May 1748 and lists livestock, farm equipment, and furniture valued at 126 pounds, appraised by Ulrich Burkhard and Peter Zouk. Barbara is believed to have died in 1759, for in the Spring of that year, the

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farm was divided between Jacob 'Tsuke' and Michael; the other children released their shares. Jacob sold to Johannes in 1773 and moved to Washington Co., MD. Johannes lived and died on the old homestead as did his son Joseph and Joseph's son Andrew who drowned in the Chickies 27 Jan 1824. All are buried in the family graveyard where a monument to their memory has been erected by Ulrich's descendants through the efforts of Mary Zug Francis of Lebanon, PA. The cemetery is located about a mile north of Penryn, PA, on the Ronald Roher farm.
"The order of children may be incorrect; they are listed as suggested by events in their lifetimes." Zug/Zuck/Zouck/Zook, by Harry D. Zook, pp. 33-35.

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"Time marches on leaving fragments of memories that lose their details in the pathway of life. Much has been written regarding the founders of the Brethren Church, in which all branches that have a common origin are meant. Older descendants of Alexander Mack are passing from the scene of life. The early pioneers of the church were too busy looking after the infant church, and incidently making a living at the same time, so that the records were more or less fragmentary. Family traditions have been handed down, which the writer [Rev. Freeman Ankrum] has been able in part to secure and record for posterity.
"Alexander Mack, the founder of the church, was born on August 3, 1679, near Schwarzenau, Germany, in Schriesheim, in the electorate of Palatia, between Mannheim and Heidelberg. He was a member of a very respectable and wealthy family. He is reported to have secured an education in one of the German universities. He was a Presbyterian educated in the Calvinistic faith. While little is known of his immediate family, one brother was a general in the German army. The man who followed the way of peace apparently is better known than the brother who essayed to follow the way of war. The young man learned the milling trade and assisted in the care of the numerous vineyards belonging to the family. Evidence would indicate that the young man was studious and thoughtful. Just thirty-one years before Alexander Mack was born, the war known as the Thirty Years' War closed with the peace of Westphalia. This had had its effect upon the state church and the populace. Its frightfulness no doubt was much discussed in the ears of the young Alexander. There had been a general decimation of the German people. Ten million people perished in the general conflict. A church historian states,
'The cruelties inflicted during the war upon the defenseless people are indescribable. The unarmed were treated with brutal ferocity. Great numbers perished by famine. More frightful than famine were the immorality and the moral decay which ensued upon the long reign of violence.'
This was the basis for the moral and religious decay of the times.
"The mind of the young man found companionship in the ideas of kindred minds. Those who so thought and felt were called, because of their piousness, 'Pietists.' The young man engaged in his daily tasks, while he no doubt performed them faithfully, was dreaming and thinking of a day when the people might get back to the solid base of the New Testament. The coldness and the callousness of the religious-minded people surrounding him caused him to become a dessenter from the faith in which he had been reared. He became a leader of like-minded students who investigated the New Testament and the records and writings of the Christian Fathers.
"Upon reaching the age of twenty-one, Alexander Mack took for his wife a young lady from the same community and about the same age, by the name of Anna Margaretha Klingen. This young lady was born on April 20, 1680 and became the bride of the thoughtful and forward-looking young man on November 4, 1700. To this union was born five children, three sons and two daughters. They were: John Valentine, Johannes, Alexander, Christina, and Anna Maria. The two daughters died in Germany, the three sons later accompanied the father to America.
"Alexander Mack was anxious to ascertain the mind of the Lord as revealed in the Scriptures, and to this source was his mind directed in searching for the old paths. In his reading he became convinced that immersion in water was the New Testament baptism, that a believer was the only proper subject for the

ordinance, and that the doctrines and practices set forth in his Plain View of the Rites and Ordinaces of the House of God are such as believers should receive and obey. Accordingly he and his wife and six others in the year 1708 were immersed in the River Eder, and covenanted together to walk in all the commandments and ordinances of the Lord. ...They learned from God's Word that ordinances were essential and creed was not. Therefore adopting the Bible as their guide and rule, they organized a church without a creed but with all the ordinaces as taught by Jesus and His followers as recorded in the New Testament.
"God protected this infant community although there was much to be endured and sacrificed by the faithful. Alexander Mack had a large share of persecution as his lot. Although he was rich, yet out of love for the brethren, he became poor like his Master before him. The heavy hand of persecution was often laid upon his brethren and they were locked up in prison. Only by paying the money levied against them in fines were they released. Unfortunately this releasement was only temporary. By paying the fines, his handsome patrimony, fine vineyards, and profitable mill were taken from him. He with his brethren sought refuge in different places from persecution, but alas those places were not to be found.
"Some of the Brethren had sailed to America [in 1719] under the leadership of Peter Becker. The remaining Brethren were obliged to flee with Mack to Westervain, West Friesland, Holland. ...After nine years in Holland, the Brethren decided to join the group which emigrated to America. From Rotterdam they departed as a congregation, and after considerable time spent in passage they landed in Philadelphia on September 15, 1729. Great was the joy of the ones who had come to America with Beter Becker when the information was conveyed to them that the beloved founder of the church had made up his mind to cast his lot with them in the new country of freedom of worship. His three sons, Valentine, John, and Alexander, Jr., accompanied the group to America. ... Alexander Mack came to America a poor man in this world's good, but rich in faith....
"Alexander Mack passed from the seen world to the unseen world on January 31, 1735. Perhaps the hardships, the losses and the sacrafices made in behalf of his God and his Brethren, hastened his departure. Fortunately, though, his last days were spent free from the shadow of constant persecution. Thus just six years after the founder of the church came to America, he closed his labors on earth. He was buried in the Upper burying ground of Germantown, sometimes known as Axe's burying ground, and the following brief inscription, in the German language, marks the place: 'Here rest the remains of A.M., born 1679, and died 1735, aged 56 years.' At this place the body remained until November 13, 1894, when it was removed to the cemetery at the Church of the Brethren at Germantown, Pennsylvania, where it now rests... The place is marked by a marble slab, bearing the following inscription:
'Alexander Mack, Sr., the first minister and organizer of the Church of the Brethren in the year 1708. Born in Schriesheim, Germany, 1679. Came to Germantown, 1729. Removed from Axe's burying ground 1894.'"

"Henry Funk was an immigrant from Europe, settling in Franconia in 1719. He became a bishop in the Franconia Church. He had literary ability. He and Dielman Kolb supervised the translation of the 'Martyr's Mirror' from the Dutch into German, printed at the 'Ephrata Cloisters' in 1748, a work covering some 1514 pages. He also was the author of several other books; he died in $1760 . "$ History of Frick's Church, by A.C. Rosenberger, (1944), p. 7.
"Bishop Henry Funck, born in Europe, either in Holland, or the Palatinate, emigrated to America in 1719, settled at Indian Creek, in Franconia Twp., Montgomery Co., PA, where he died in 1760. He was married to Anne Meyer, daughter of the pioneer Christian Meyer, of Salford Twp., Montgomery Co., who emigrated from Europe to America about 1700. Anne, wife of Henry Funck, died July 8, 1758.
"Henry Funck purchased three tracts of land, in all 201 acres, lying along the Indian Creek, in Franconia Twp., Montgomery Co., PA, where he settled and built the first mill on the Indian Creek.
"Christian Funk, in his 'Mirror to all Mankind,' says that his father 'came from Europe in 1719, settled at the Indian Creek; other of his brethren came over from Europe and then Henry Funk was elected as minister to serve the

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church at Franconia, ' of which he was the first minister, and later was ordained bishop in which office he served a long time.
"He held his membership at Franconia, and besides ministering to that congregation, he also preached at Clemen's, now Salford; in Skippack, and the 'Plains,' which included Hatfield and Towamencin, and other places.
"Henry Funck was the author of two religious works, one a small book in German entitled, Spiegel der Taufe, --Mirror of Baptism, and the other a larger work, entitled, Eine Restitution, oder eine Erklaerung einiger Hauptpunkte des Gesetzes, which was published after his death in 1763, and was reprinted at Biel, Switzerland, in 1844, and at Lancaster, PA, in 1862.
"He also, in connection with Dielman Kolb, was appointed by the Mennonite church to supervise the translation of van Bracht's Martyrs Mirror, or Der Blutige Schauplatz, from the Dutch to the German, a folio of 1514 pages printed at Ephrata in 1748. It was one of the largest works published in this country during the Colonial period.
"Bishop Henry Funck was well educated for the times, and was a man of extensive influence in his church and community. He was a faithful and zealous servant for his Master, and did much to advance the interests of his church.
"His Will which was very lengthy and explicit, he wrote with his own hand--June 13, 1759, in the German language. In its provisions and composition it is a somewhat singular document, 'but to the sincere Christian it has lessons of instruction and examples, in the highest degree worthy of imitation, which to the large number of the descendants of its author, it is full of interest'..." A Brief History of Bishop Henry Funck and other Funk Pioneers, and a complete Genealogical Family Register, by Rev. A.J. Fretz, (1899), pp. 11-13.
"Of the personal history of Henry Funk, the following sketch has been furnished by a grandson, Rev. Benjamin Funk, of Singers Glen, VA.
'Men are very prone at the present day to repeat what was long ago said, "If we had lived in the days of our fathers, we would not have permitted their bones to fall into their graves and buried out of sight, unmarked, unnumbered and unsung." With but few exceptions, however, the same may be said to the generation now living that was said to the scribes and Pharisees, "As your fathers did, so do ye." But it is a matter of congratulation that some are turning attention to family genealogy. Whilst we lament the meagre and fragmentary character of the data, which, like the relics of upturned grave yards, lie strewn upon the ground or buried beneath its surface, and which require great labor and time to gather up, still perhaps enough may be found to show in those loins the members of the same great family may have reposed one hundred and seventy years ago.
'The Funk family in America have sprung from an ancestry whose lines are well marked as far as they can be traced. These lines, however, are mainly found within the limits of agricultural industry, genuine morality, and sincere earnestness in the performance of the duties of the Christian religion, coupled with a firm faith in its saving power. No fame of arms-bearing or military skill has ever been attached to any bearing the name of Funk. The records of American history, at least, are silent, and know not the name. But other records are also silent. The state prison of Virginia has never incarcerated a convict of the name of Funk belonging to the line descended from the pioneer of the Virginia

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Valley. But the records of the Christian church, especially of that branch of it known as the Mennonite church, are alive with the names of pioneers and heroes in the several generations of Funks that have lived since the establishment of the church in America. First and foremost among these stands the name of Henry Funck, whom fancy pictures as a tall man, having a large and well proportioned frame, very muscular, with dark hair and eyes, a face indicating great firmness and resolution, and a body capable of enduring great hardships. How nearly this fancied representation of him may correspond with truth, cannot be said. But of this there is such proof, that he was a man of great mental and moral force.
'His German writings which his grandson Joseph read much, and to which he often alluded in the presence of his children as being the production of their great grandfather, were eminently pious and full of love to God and man.
'Of Henry Funck, of Indian Creek notoriety, whose memory is embalmed in the heart of Franconia township, Montgomery County, Pennsylvania, nothing more need be said...." Ibid, pp. 140-142.

"Christian Meyer, progenitor of a family numerously represented in Montgomery counties in Pennsylvania, throughout the western states and Canada, settled in Lower Salford Twp., Montgomery Co., PA.
"Tradition points to Switzerland as the fatherland, where the Mennonites, for which sect he belonged, were unmercifully persecuted by the State church, which he, with others, unable longer to endure, abandoned their homes in the mountain fastnesses and fled for safety in the Netherlands. From thence, about 1700 or later, Christian Meyer, of Amsterdam, sailed for Pennsylvania, and located at the Indian Creek, Montgomery Co., PA, where he had purchased a farm containing 150 acres, sometime prior to 1719 , and to which he received a patent from the Hon. John Penn, Thomas Penn and Richard Penn, Sept. 6, 1734.
"There has been preserved a description of a cabin erected by him, and which probably was the first Meyer domicile in the Western world, and consisted of four forked saplings driven into the ground, in the forks of which were laid poles, and on these a roof of poles, and the walls were of upright poles. A single opening served for an entrance, and the whole was built with an axe. An article of furniture which adorned this primitive house was a large Dutch clock, brought from the Old World, a much treasured relic of the late Tillman W. Moyer, of Campden, Ontario, Canada.
"Christian Meyer made his Will Jan. 18, 1748. It was probated June 6, 1751, which shows he died in the early part of 1751. His wife Barbara died before he wrote his will. Farmer. Mennonites. In old deeds and other papers signed 100 or 150 years ago, the name was always written Meyer or Mayer. The original spelling of the name in the old country therefore seems evidently to have been Meyer or Mayer. "Hans Lienhart (Leonhart) Altorfer, citizen and farmer of Steinsfurt, was baptized Kloten, Switzerland, 18 Oct 1674, died Steinsfurt, 2 March 1736, the son of Hans (Johannes) Altorfer and Elsbeth (Fretz). The boy Hans came to Steinsfurt from Kloten when he was about 10 years old. He married first in Steinsfurt, 20 Nov 1703, Anna Magdalena (widow of Hans Wurffel who died 2 May 1703, he came from Weiningen, Canton Zurich, to Steinsfurt). She was born about 1669 , and died at Steinsfurt, 17 Apr 1713 ( 44 years old). Hans Lienhart Altorfer married second about 1713-15 Anna Barbara. "The name of Rosenberger is of ancient origin in Germany, signifying Rosemount or Rose Castle. The first Rosenbergers in America probably came from the Palatinate, once a province of western Germany, bordering on the Rhine.... The first settler of the name of Rosenberger in Montgomery county was Henry Rosenberger, who came to the Indian Creek valley, in Franconia township, in

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1729. 

"It is a tradition of the family that the Rosenbergers of Montgomery County, PA, came from Germany, from a place called 'Zweibrucken' (two bridges). ...The time of emigration of Henry Rosenberger, Sr. is not known, but was in all probability between the years of 1720 and 1729 .
"All the earlier members of these families belonged to the religious sect called Mennonites and worshipped at Franconia and Line Lexington meetinghouses." A Genealogical Record of the Descendants of Henry Rosenberger of Franconia, Montgomery Co., PA, by Rev. A.J. Fretz, (1906), pp. 13-14.
"Henry Rosenberger is believed to have been the first of the name who came to Montgomery County as an emigrant from Germany, and was a Mennonite. He purchased land in Franconia on November 14, 1729, of James Steele, of Philadelphia. For 30 pounds he obtained 150 acres. This was situated about two and one-half miles west of Souderton. It covered an area through which flows the Indian Creek. The greater part was the slope toward the northwest from the present Souderton and Harleysville turnpike to that stream, and including the site of the Mennonite burying ground. Within these boundaries are now the farm of Jacob S. Alderfer, Schueck's mill and the farm of Michael Swartley. The latter is the fifth in descent from Henry Rosenberger and owns the homestead. Here down in the valley of the Indian Creek and on its southeast side is a stone farm house of unusual size. It bears the date of 1809 and the name of John 'Schwardle' in German, who was the grandfather of the present owner. To the north is a modern barn and close to hand an older one. The latter is the oldest building about the premises. On the wooden beam over the door is inscribed the name of Henry Rosenberger and Barbara, his wife, with the date of 1755. The first barn of all, in existence between 1730 and 1755 , stood more closely adjacent to the banks of the stream, which was thought handy to wash away the manure at a time this was thought of little value. A stone springhouse stands 70 yards west of the house near the creek and bears the date of 1793. For this distance the water for household purposes was carried for three or four generations. In the present garden, just west of the house, stood the humble log dwelling which sheltered the old Mennonite emigrant and his family. It was only one and one-half stories high and existed for 80 years.
"Nothing is known of the personality of Henry Rosenberger. He built a house and barn and cleared some land, enduring the hardships of a first settler. In the year 1745 he conveyed his plantation in Franconia to his son Henry. The bounderies of the deed of 1745 are copied from the first deed and Henry Funk and Christian Meyer, two Mennonites, were the witnesses. The son Henry paid his father 200 pounds. It is not known what became of the father after conveying his plantation to his son, but he probably remained with Henry.
"It is not known when Henry Rosenberger died. He was a Mennonite and one of the original worshippers at Franconia, where he was also buried.... We name as the children of Henry Rosenberger, Sr., Benjamin, Daniel, John, Henry, Jr. If there were daughters we have not learned of them." A Genealogical Record of the Descendants of Henry Rosenberger of Franconia, Montgomery Co., PA, by Rev. A.J. Fretz, (1906), excerpts from pp. 18-21.
"Heinrich (Henry) Rosenberger, Sr., was the pioneer or the first emigrant without doubt. Records reveal that on November 14, 1729, he purchased 159 acres of virgin land in Indian Creek Valley, now Franconia Township, Montgomery

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County, Pennsylvania. This was a part of the 1000 acres which Penn's Commissioners of property had sold in 1728 to James Steele of Philadelphia. He immediately cleared the land and cultivated it. He built a house of native stone and a large barn for animals and to store crops. He put aside a small portion of land as a burial ground, and was buried there. It was here in 1730 that the first Franconia Mennonite meetings were held in a log building (probably his first dwelling). In 1833 this meetinghouse was replaced with one made of stone. Again in 1892 it was rebuilt and in 1917 an addition made. It is located west of Telford, Montgomery County, PA, on Route 113." "Franconia Township is situated in the northeastern part of the county

[Montgomery County], joining Bucks County on the northeast, and joining Upper and Lower Salford and Hatfield townships on the west, south and east. Its area is 14,875 square miles, or 9520 acres. The surface is generally level, but sufficiently undulating to be susceptible of surface drainage into the headwaters of the Skippack and Indian Creeks, both of which flow through the township, affording light but useful waterpowers and mill-sites. The East Branch of the Perkiomen Creek flows along the northwestern boundary of the township.
"The name Franconia is derived from an old duchy which afterwards formed a circle of the Germanic Empire, and signifies 'Land of the Frank,' whence also France. On Holme's map of 1682 it is called 'The Dutch township,' from which we infer that the Germans were its earliest settlers.
"In 1734 the township contained thirty-four taxables and land-holders, nearly all German. Amongst these may be mentioned John Fry, 150 acres; Henry Rosenberger, 125; Jacob Oberholtzer, 150; Christian Meyer, 150;...."
"Christian Meyer arrived in 1727; ...Johannes Fry in 1730. One of the first settlers of the township is said to have been Christian Funk, who settled on Indian Creek.... History of Montgomery County, Pennsylvania, edited by Theodore W. Bean, p. 827.

"Christian Meyer, Jr., born about 1705, died about 1787. Married Magdalena. He lived in Franconia Township where he purchased of James Steel and wife Martha of Philadelphia, 170 acres of land, Nov. 14, 1729. His farm was bounded by lands of Henry Rosenberger, John Freed, Martin Detweiler, George Delp, and others. In his will dated April 26 , 1782, he devised this whole tract of 170 acres of land to his son Samuel Moyer, for the sum of 800 pounds of gold or silver.
"On May 1, 1794, Samuel Moyer, then of Hilltown Twp., Bucks Co., and Catharine his wife, conveyed to their son Isaac Moyer, of Franconia Twp., 87 acres and 73 perches of the said 170 acres, and on the same date, May 1, 1794, Samuel Moyer and his wife Catharine granted to their son Christian 87 acres and 76 perches, being also a part of the 170 -acre tract. On April 7, 1810, Christian Moyer (son of Samuel) and his wife Mary, of Bedminister, Bucks Co., granted to their son Rudolph the same 87 acres 76 perches, and on Nov. 20 1866, Rudolph Moyer and his wife Barbara granted to their son Abraham F., the present owner, the same tract and premises. The said plantation of 170 acres is now divided into three farms, owned and occupied by Abraham F. Moyer, Benjamin P. Moyer, and Henry B. Kulp.
"The tract was in the first place a regular parallelogram, 283 perches long and 96 perches wide and included all the land belonging to the Mennonite church (about 3 acres) except the graveyard. The land extended all the way from the corner of the Mennonite church southwest along the Harleysville and Souderton turnpike 283 perches, $7 / 8$ of a mile to the corner of the other road generally known as Young's corner. The old homestead proper where Christian Meyer, Jr., lived is located $1 / 2$ a mile southwest of the Franconia Mennonite church, where now lives Abraham F. Moyer, a great-grandson of Christian Meyer, Jr. The farm has been in the same family now for 166 years. Mr. Moyer, the present owner, still recollects when the first house (probably built by Christian Meyer, Jr.) was torn down. It did not stand quite on the same place where the present house stands.
"Christian Meyer, Jr., was a very prominent Mennonite, and stood front in the church. He was one of the founders of the Mennonite meetinghouse in Salford, the ground for which was purchased in 1738 by Henry Funck, Dielman Kolb, ministers, and Christian Meyer, Jr., and Abraham Reiff, deacons. He was later chosen to the ministry and served at Franconia. He was also one of the chief actors in the controversy with his nephew, Rev. Christian Funk, who was expelled from the church on account of his attitude toward Congress, and conducted an examination into the matter at the Plain Mennonite meetinghouse.
"He made his last will and testament April 26, 1782, and which was probated May 31, 1787. He probably died in the early part of 1787. His son Samuel Moyer, and his son-in-law Abraham Kratz, were the executors of his estate." "Jacob came with his family to Philadelphia in 1750 aboard the ship 'Brotherhood,' which came to America from Rotterdam. After arriving he moved to Northampton Country, near the present site of Cementon, and filed claim for some 400 acres. Later he was taken to court by William Allen, founder of Allentown, Pennsylvania, who apparently had a prior claim to the land. The court decided to make them joint owners of the property, and then Mr. Allen purchased Jacob's interest, subdivided the land, and sold pacels to Jacob's sons and son-in-laws. This is now the site of Whitehall Portland Cement Company, and the land was worth a fortune had the family only known it.
"Jacob and his wife are the progenitors of a huge number of Showalter descendants in this country -- undoubtedly the majority of those carrying the name can be traced to him. He and his wife are said to have had eleven children who lived to adulthood, and in addition another son is said to have died and been buried at sea when they came to this country. Tradition also hold that Jacob was a Mennonite preacher, but apparently this has not been verified. He is said to have died at the home of his daughter Margaret in 1773. Many of his descendants are buried at Siegfried, Pennsylvania." Ancestors and Descendants of Reuben Showalter, by Lloyd G. Ferrell, (Bellingham, WA: Private printing, 1980), p. 511.

"The young lady whose hand Valentine Mack won had had a varied religious experience. She early joined the Virgin Sisters at Ephrata. After living for some time there, she returned to the home of her people in Germantown. She was known in Ephrata as Sister Abigail. To Valentine and Maria Mack was born one child, a daughter, in 1732. The daughter also entered the Ephrata community and was known as Sister Constantia.... She never married." "Alexander Mack, Jr., made an excellent bishop and served the church faithfully for over fifty years. Though quiet, reserved, standing against the innovations of the world, he was still tender to the erring and had a warm heart for the penitent. He is said to have saluted an applicant for membership before baptism, calling him brother. Yet when an erring brother would not heed his pleadings, after a year of prayerful exhortation and labor, he would 'set back' this one from the communion service. While he was not, from the standpoint of sloquence, a powerful preacher, his pen ministry was larger than that of any other member of the early colonial church. Many of his letters have been preserved and reflect the ideals and the spirit of the times. He was an author of prominence and defended well the doctrines of the Brethren in a number of able treatises. In addition to the aforementioned, he was one of the best of poets and hymn writers of the early church. He was always exceedingly thoughtful of the poor and never missed an opportunity of helping the needy everywhere. Alexander Mack the Tunker and Descendants, by Rev. Freeman Ankrum, p. 18. Some Who Led, by D.L. Miller and Galen B. Royer, (Elgin, IL: Brethren Publishing House, 1912), pp. 23-25.
"As regards the character of Alexander Mack, Jr., he is represented as a sincere, good man, much given to retirement; by occupation a stocking weaver; and as his worldly possessions were but small, so his wants were but few, which made his contentment equally complete.
"In his public preaching it is said he did not manifest much oratory, but with the pen he was very ready and fluent. He had a particular talent for poetry, as many hundred of his verses and poetic stanzas still exist. He possessed a remarkable degree of sagacity and discernment, so that no art could ensnare him or hypocrisy beguile him.
"He died on the 20th of March 1803 at the advanced age of ninety-one years, one month and twenty days. His last words were: 'Num reisz ich gegen Morgen, wer mit will der mach sich eilends fertig.' Although he was as well yet as usual, he had a strange presentiment of his dissolution being near. He therefore composed the following epitaph for his grave-stone, which he brought to his daughter, Anna Fox, telling her that his departure was at hand now, and that this was his last visit to her, as it proved to be. The epitaph may yet be seen on his tomb-stone in the Brethren's grave-yard, in Germantown, in the following words:

Gott! der uns hat aus staub gemacht,
Und wiederum -- zu staub gebracht,
Wird zeugen seiner weisheit-macht,
Wann wir mach seinem bild erwacht."

"After the death of the father of Valentine Mack, he took up his abode in Ephrata along with the father and mother of his wife, John and Maria Hildebrand. "Christian Funk was born in 1731 and seems to have inherited some of his fathers qualifications. John C. Wenger in his History of Franconia credits him with writing the 1773 letters to the Holland Mennonites. John D. Souder, a Mennonite historian, says Christian Funk is the author of the German hymn book Die Kleine Geistlichs Harfe, Der Kinder Zions used in Mennonite Churches until 1931. He probably was one of a committee to select the hymns for this book. Christian Funk was bishop at Franconia during the American Revolution.
"Franconia Township was composed largely of Mennonites, and about 1774 this society was considerably shaken by the surges of the Revolution. Being non-resistant in doctrine they were looked upon as Tories by the Revolutionary elements. They suffered the loss of some of their best horses, cattle, and grain, but since they did not show any signs of hostility to the government or the army, there was no trouble in that respect. But the different views held by the leaders of the Church on the question of the 'oath of allegiance' and the payment of taxes demanded by the Congress brought matters into the open among

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themselves.
"In 1776 a public meeting was called in Franconia Township to select three men who were to attend delegations from other sections which were already engaged in war. Christian Funk attended this meeting and took the position that since they were a defenseless people they could neither institute or destroy any government.
"When Pennsylvania joined the other provinces, the Mennonites thought their liberty of conscience was lost, and when Pennsylvania like all other states required an 'oath of allegiance' it was very much objected to, as it might compell them to take up arms against the King. As the war continued mutual abuses by those in favor of the new Congress, or the king, continued.
"Christian Funk was an intelligent man. He studied the Constitution of the new government and saw that the same liberty of conscience was granted and that none were compelled to bear arms or take an oath against his conscience. Thereafter Funk began to talk in favor of the new government and advocated the use of the currency issued by the Congress for the payment of taxes, debts, etc.
"Funk's fellow ministers opposed the payment of taxes, as being hostile to the King; until 1778, when the feeling against Funk became very marked. Unworthy personal matters were injected and the situation became so tense that Christian Funk was excommunicated for taking sides with a rebellious government. Funk and his followers continued to worship on the Sunday when the main group had no service, until they were locked out and guards set to deny entrance. After this they worshipped in houses and barns until after the death of Christian Funk in 1811.
"I [A.C. Rosenberger] have covered certain events of this period for the purpose of showing the descendants of this generation, that Christian Funk was no heretic, that he did not violate any cardinal doctrine of the Christian faith, and that after 1783 he made repeated efforts for a union. In 1804, after ten of the Bishops had died who deposed him, he made a personal appeal but was rejected because he would not forsake the ministers whom he had ordained.
"No house of worship was built until after his death. In 1809 he published a booklet, A Mirror For All Mankind. He died in 1811 at the age of eighty. He is buried in a semi-neglected cemetery at Delps Church, one mile north of Harleysville. After the death of Christian Funk, his followers built four houses of worship in Montgomery County, one of which remains, 'Fricks'....
"It is probable that the first Church was built in 1812 or 1813. It was evidently built by the 'Funkites' for they worshipped here. They were known as 'Funkite Mennonites'....
"John Funk and Jacob Detwiler were the ministers. Mr. Souder speaks of Rev. Funk also preaching at Germantown, traveling there on horseback over traditional Indian trails. He died in 1820 and is buried at Fricks. Jacob Detwiler moved to Canada with his family in 1823 and became a respected minister among the Mennonites.
"Here the followers of Christian Funk seem to have found a place to worship and for some years seemed to prosper. But the movement had one weakness, Christian Funk, in his desires and hopes for a reunion with the main body, failed to provide a strong leadership. After his death leadership fell upon 'John Funk,' who does not seem to have been qualified as a leader, and so no provision was made to shepherd the flock; by 1850 the Funkites were extinct. Some of the remaining 'Funkites' united with the Brethren in Christ Church at

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Silverdale; others with the Church of the Brethren at Hatfield and Vernfield; and still others returned to the main Mennonite body.
"It is said that David Rosenberger of Unionville, was the last original member of the 'Funkites' buried at Fricks in 1903. At his death he was a member of the Church of the Brethren and he left money for maintenance.
"Untouched by modern embellishments 'Fricks Church' and location is unique. Situated one-fourth mile off the main road on a branch of the Neshaminy, it has remained un-noticed and unknown, fascinating in its primitive simplicity.
"As one enters the building he is impressed with the simple but comfortable arrangement. Swinging hat racks with wooden pegs are on the right side. The pulpit of colonial style is in the center on the north side. The west side is the women's side. It is well lighted and the benches are comfortable. Here at regular intervals the worshippers came in horse drawn carriages. Their only adornment was simplicity.
"As the strains of simple old fashioned German songs stirred their emotions and their hearts became receptive, the 'Word' spoken in the power of the 'Spirit' brought forth a worship in spirit and truth.
"One may go there during the summer months and in undisturbed meditation, enchanted by the music of the rippling stream, the morning and evening songs of the birds almost bursting their throats in their desire to glorify God.
"The stately maples casting their shadows, long and deep, across the cemetery, remind us of the shadows and sorrows of life which are often long and deep. And in the stillness of the hour, our hearts yearn for that eternal peace and rest which the 'Son of God' alone can give.
"May the blessings of a Godly heritage enrich and comfort us in the better and nobler things of life, until we abound in every good work for His glory." History of Frick's Church, by A.C. Rosenberger, (1944), excerpts from pp. 7-20.

"Frederick Alderfer, pioneer settler of Lower Salford Township, then in Philadelphia, but now in Montgomery County, in the Province of Pennsylvania, the ancestor of the family of this record, was born in Steinsfurt, Germany, (the territory of the Lutheran Knights of Kraichgow, southeast of Heidelberg) on the 18 th day of May, 1715 , and christened the following day -- May 19th, in the Lutheran faith, a tradition that was handed down from earliest memory among the descendants. His family Bible, believed to have later belonged to his son Joseph, has not been located.
"Friedrich Altorfer as the name was then spelled, was the son of Lienhart Hans Altorfer who was born at Kloten, Switzerland, October 8, 1674, and died at Steinsfurt, Germany, March 2, 1736, and his second wife Anna Barbara.
"Apparently young Frederick Alderfer left his native village of Steinsfurt early in 1733, just before his eighteen birthday and traveled down the Rhine River, as did hundreds of others that year. The religious and political strife, the persecution and privation suffered throughout Germany and Switzerland from the time of the Reformation are too well known as history to need repeating here. The Rhine was the great highway through Palatine Germany and strong oarsmen rowed the river boats loaded with passengers to the seaports of Holland. Refugees from Switzerland and the Rhine Valley crowded the quays and jostled each other seeking transportation aboard a ship bound for William Penn's Colony. We know that Frederick Alderfer was one of those who went aboard a vessel at Rotterdam and signed passage papers for the English colonies.
"Fortunately, the names and ages of the passengers on board the ship Samuel of London, Commanded by Captain Hugh Percy, were carefully listed. Frederick Alldorfer, aged 18 years, was among the Palatines on board the Samuel which arrived at the port of Philadelphia on August 17, 1733. He was one of ninety Palatines, who with their families, made in all two hundred and ninety-one persons, ( 90 men, aged 16 and upwards) on board ship. They had embarked from Rotterdam and received clearance from Deal, a port on the English coast.
"The voyage across the Atlantic Ocean with even the best wind and weather usually lasted about seven or eight weeks, frequently much longer. It was at

best a harrowing experience, often described as a time of utmost misery, an ordeal of terror and a true test of spiritual strength and physical endurance. Many did not survive, especially the aged and young children.
"In order to finance the voyage people literally sold themselves into service by first signing a contract with the ship's captain whereby it was agreed that he would provide daily rations and transport to Philadelphia, where, upon arrival they would be consigned to a Philadelphia merchant. The merchant paid the captain a set fee for each 'freight' he carried over and delivered alive. Children under twelve went half-fare. The 'passage now--pay later' plan required that passengers remain on board the ship until arrangements were completed and the contract signed.
"Our ancestor, Friederich Alldorfer, who arrived in 1733 , signed his name in German, firmly and with something of a flourish, to the oaths of abjuration and allegiance at the courthouse in Philadelphia.
"He was alone, a youth of eighteen years, with no funds to pay for his passage. So he signed an indenture, i.e. a contract with Hans Klemer (now sp. Clemmer) of Lower Salford by which he bound himself to work for an agreed number of years to redeem the debt for passage money paid by Mr. Clemmer.
"It appears that Frederick Alderfer had served out his time when he witnessed the conveyance for a tract of 59 acres which Hans Reiff sold to Christian Allebach, on September 14, 1737.
"In that same fall of 1737, Hans Clemmer, although apparently still a young man, died. On December 24, 1737, letters of administration were granted to Anna Clemer of County of Philadelphia, widow and relict of John Clemer of same place....
"Anna, widow of Hans Clemmer was the daughter of pioneer settler Hans (John) Detwiler of Skippack and his wife Susanna. Hans Detwiler with his wife and children arrived sometime before 1725 . He was naturalized in 1730 and acquired a large tract of land in Skippack where his occupation was both farmer and weaver. It is presumed that he and his wife are buried at Lower Skippack Mennonite Cemetery. His will was probated June 26,1761 ; his daughter was called Anna Mary in her father's will, but she was known as Anna to her contemporaries.
"Besides his widow Anna, Hans Clemmer left two small daughters named Susanna and Catharine Clemmer. The elder daughter, Susanna, was born November 14, 1732 and died March 28, 1750. The other daughter, Catharine, was born July 4,1734 , and married Christian Hunsberger of Franconia. They were the ancestors of many of the Hunsbergers of this region. The original Hunsberger farm was located on part of the site of the present borough of Souderton.
"Living in a clearing deep in the woods, in a small log house, facing the winter alone with her two small daughters was a serious matter for the young widow. So it came about that Anna Detwiler Clemmer married the 23 year old Frederick Alderfer early in 1738. Presumably, Frederick and Anna Alderfer lived in the $\log$ house erected by Hans Clemmer on the 100 acre tract in Salford....
"The law of the Province of Pennsylvania, enacted in 1740, decreed that all foreign born inhabitants had to be naturalized in order to devise their lands to their descendants. Frederick Alderfer was naturalized at a Supreme Court held in Philadelphia at the sessions of April 11, 12, 13, 1743. Those whose conscience 'scrupled' to take an oath 'affirmed.' A large group from Lower Salford Township attended this session, among whom were Valentine Kratz, John Clemens, Jacob Oberholtzer, Hans Reiff, Henry Rosenberger, and others whose names are familiar to the area.

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"In 1764 Frederick Alderfer purchased a grist mill and 150 acres with messuage and improvements from John Clemens. Thereafter he was termed 'miller' and subsequently assessed for this property until he sold it to his son John. It seems doubtful that Frederick ever lived at the mill, he probably continued to live in the homestead where his wife Anna's death occured January 18, 1767, at five o'clock in the afternoon, aged 55 years." Alderfers of America, by Helen Alderfer Stanley, (1972), excerpts from pp. 37-41.
"Although it does not appear that the Alderfers were an early family in the township [Lower Salford], they have now become numerous and influential, holding here a considerable amount of real estate. The voters' list for 1883 furnishes twenty-six names. In the assessment of 1776 we find the names of Frederick Alderfer, miller, holding four hundred and ninety acres, and John and Jacob Alderfer, his sons. The mill property is situated on the Northeast Branch, a mile north of Lederachsville. It is now owned by J.S. Groff, a son-in-law of the family." "In the spring of 1721 , Daniel Borneman, son of Mr. Borneman, who was a soldier, during life, in the Swiss Army, left his native home in Switzerland, on the left branch of the river Rhine, came to the nearest seaport, and took passage on an English merchant ship, to be landed at Philadelphia, in the province of Pennsylvania, under the existing emigration laws, viz: that all persons, male or female, wishing to come to America, and had no means to defray expenses, the captain of the ship had the right to bind them out for two years, at twenty pounds for the passage, and an outfit at the expiration of the term, with certain tools specified to said Emigration Act. All such persons arriving in America were called 'redemptioners.'
"It was customary that every ship should report at the harbor of her country, and pay the duty upon her cargo, as fixed by existing laws. The captain in charge of the vessel failed to comply with the above laws, sailed directly for America, and when he had crossed the ocean, he suggested to land them at Jamestown, Virginia, the climate being milder, and it would be far better for poor people to gain a livelihood. At that time, the right to sell as slaves, both white and black, existed in the province of Virginia, of which the passengers on board were aware. The passengers refused to accept the change. He then steered up the Bay, so that land was seen by evening, but by the morning they would be out to sea again. He again renewed his efforts to land them at Virginia. He said he could not make the port of Philadelphia. He went up and down the Delaware Bay for about a week, coming up by evening so that land could be seen, and by morning they were at sea again. Now the passengers resolved that they would not be imposed upon, and threatened to put the captain in chains if he would not land them at Philadelphia according to agreement; and when he found that he could not prevail upon them, then seeing his danger, he ran up Delaware Bay until it was necessary to signal for a pilot; the pilot came, and the captain ordered him to wreck the vessel on a shoal, because he was frustrated in his plans. He had intended to sell the passengers in Virginia for slaves. He and his crew intended to become pirates upon American waters. Finally, they came up the Bay until it was but twelve miles wide, and one hundred miles below Philadelphia, and within three miles of the New Jersey side. The vessel was run on a shoal, sprung a leak, and sunk.
"The signal of distress was hoisted, and the citizens of New Jersey, seeing it, hastened to their rescue. In the meantime, the captain and pilot took the long boat and ran out to sea. How many were on board, I am unable to say: but by evening they were all brought safely on shore, losing everything they had. They encamped on the shore during the night, and when all was quiet the captain and pilot returned and set the vessel on fire and burned it. What became of the captain is unknown.
"The news spread rapidly through the thinly settled province of New Jersey, that a ship with German emigrants had been wrecked one hundred miles

from Philadelphia, and had lost everything. When they proceeded up the country, they were met by the good citizens, who brought them provisions and such necessaries of which they were in need, until they had reached Philadelphia. As the captain had failed to land them at Philadelphia, they were all free.
"Daniel Borneman, the history of whose descendants I [J.H. Borneman] am about to write, travelled through the country to the vicinity where Doylestown, in Bucks County, now stands, where he obtained work to grub new ground at two shillings per acre. How long he worked at that place, and at what age he arrived in this country, is not exactly known, but tradition tells us that he left his native home before he was old enough to serve in the army. He settled on a tract of land in Upper Hanover Township, county of Philadelphia, about three miles from what is now the village of Pennsburg....
"He was married to Miss Gehman, and settled on the foregoing tract. He died in 1768.... Daniel Borneman had children born to him, viz: Barbara, married to Michael Deiterly; Susanna, married to Herman Zimmermein; Christian Borneman, born in 1735; Henry Borneman, born in 1740; and Elizabeth, married to Kaup. 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"John Rosenberger, a contemporary of Benjamin Rosenberger and Daniel Rosenberger, was a substantial landowner in what is now Montgomery County. He was a Mennonite and was one of the trustees who in 1752 purchased the land on which the Lexington Mennonite Meeting House was built. It appears that the date when he purchased the land on which he built his home was about 1749 or 1750 . On land which he later purchased he established a grist-mill sometime before the Revolution. This mill was the first in the region and it remained in existence until the second decade of the nineteenth century.

Mathews has written of him: 'He came to Franconia, worked faithfully upon the Indian Creek farm, and found favor in his master's eyes as a worthy man. What is more, he found favor with his daughter Mary [Magdalena], his future wife, and after obtaining his freedom, he married her. It was a good stroke of business, for he obtained a good wife, and inherited a fine farm, which he

Compiler comment: We had very little information about George and his progenitors until March 1991. I wasn't sure that George Swartz and Mary Moyer -- on the L.D.S. I.G.I. --- were my ancestors. Their (IGI) record indicates that George and Mary were married at the German Reformed Church, Tohickon, Bucks Co., PA. My research seems to indicate that the Swartz families were Mennonites; I don't know why they were married in the Lutheran and Reformed church. According to History of Bucks County, p. 579,
"The Tohickon church, Lutheran and Reformed, is located in the western corner of Bedminster township, on the old Bethlehem road, thirty-four miles north of Philadelphia, near the Tohickon creek. The building is a solid stone structure, fifty by sixty feet in dimensions, erected in 1838 by Elias Nunemaker, contractor."

Reading further in History of Bucks County, pp. 269-270, a lengthy biographical sketch reveals that the nephew of Mary Moyer Swartz, (Henry O. Moyer, son of Samuel B. Moyer) was a member of the German Reformed Church.

"In 1841 Benjamin was born and died shortly after and was buried beside his little brother of a few months before.
"Magdalena (Behm)(Ardner) was born April 28 th, 1844 on the farm nearby which they had purchased on May 6th, 1840, which consisted of 160 acres. It was situated two-and-one-half miles southeast of the little town of Bloomville in Bloom Township and cost them $\$ 1500$. At that time it was known as the District of Bucyrus. This was bought from Henry Troxel and wife who had bought it from his brother in 1836 for $\$ 200$. Jacob had purchased it from the government on October 8th, 1834.
"Both Frederick and Mary (Fry) Alderfer, being of deep Christian character, showed deep interest in the religious affairs of the early settlers as they came to the County just fourteen years after its organization.
"He became one of the ministers of the [Mennonite] church, this church having burned and never rebuilt. The families joined the Church of the Brethren, then known as the 'Dunkirks' [sic] who had a thriving congregation just north of the town of Bloomville. He became an elder, rather a district preacher. The churches being few and far between he would go on horseback many miles to preach, thus became an old circuit rider of those days. He was considered a man of wealth those days as he was the owner of two ox teams besides his riding horse. A story has been handed down as follows:

and later that night he became ill and died two weeks later on July $7 \mathrm{th}, 1853$. His body was buried side of his true wife and two little sons in the little graveyard southeast of Bloomville, Ohio. This hallowed spot has been visited by us and the tombstones are marked plainly. He was yet a young man of only forty-three years.
"Thus ended the earthly life of one who instilled into the veins of these families, none of which carry his name, but who should and do respect him as their father. Without a question this act was caused because of his outwardness against sin which has caused the death of many who stood firm in the faith of Him who gave His life on the cross for us.
"We have not the families of the older four daughters complete but I will give you what I have found.
"Fannie married George Kintner, and they had twelve children, two dying in infancy.
"Elizabeth married a brother of George whose name was Andrew
Kintner. To this union seventeen children were born. Only seven grew to maturity. Sarah, the oldest, died at the age of 23 years and was never married. Two daughters and four sons married. In 1924 Elizabeth had 34 grandchildren ( 31 living) and 51 great-grandchildren ( 49 living).
"Mary at sixteen married Martin Hiestant and moved to Upper
Sandusky, Ohio and later moved to Red Kay, Indiana, where she died April 14, 1915 and was brought back to Ohio for burial in the Union Cemetery about five miles south of Sycamore, Ohio, which is not far from Upper Sandusky, Ohio. To this union six children were born....
"Anna married David Traxler and had ten children. This is all the information I have....
"Magdalena married John Behm in January 1862, to this union six children were born. Only one now survives. Soon after their marriage they moved to Inwood, Indiana where they remained until after the third child was born, returning to Seneca County in the winter of 1869.
"Mary Mariah (my mother) still living, born in Inwood, Indiana, October 3rd, 1868. She was raised near Bloomville, Seneca Co., Ohio until fourteen years old. Then she came to a farm near Tiffin where she started working out after moving. She married Morris Robert Groman, formally [sic] of Lehigh Co., PA, February 2nd, 1888 by the late Dr. Rust of Second Reformed Church of which they both became members. Ten children were born to this union, six boys and four girls.... Tebalt Robert (known as Ted) -- the writer -- born June 8th, 1893.

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[^1]:    'His poor Catholic neighbors wished to build a church of logs and had no ox teams to draw them, so came to him and asked if they could hire his ox teams to draw their logs from the woods nearby. He said, "No, but I will take my team and draw them for you without cost." This he did. A year later during harvest he was called fifty miles to preach the funeral of a child, and by doing so he knew he would lose his crops, as they needed harvesting at once. Yet, at the sacrifice he went as it was his duty to his Christ and God as well as man. When he returned, expecting to find his crops ruined, as it required no less than a three day journey, he found to his surprise that his harvest was all taken care of while he was gone. His Catholic neighbors had heard of his mission so came and took care of his crops as an appreciation of what he had done for them the year before.'
    "On June 2nd, 1847 he disposed of forty acres of this land to Christian Brand for $\$ 500$ and on August 17 th, 1849 he sold forty acres to his son-in-law, J.G. Kintner for $\$ 400$.
    "On April 10th, 1851 the darkest cloud of his life came over his home when his beloved wife, Mary (Fry), passed away in death. Having small children, he needed help so he remarried some time after a Margaret Johnson, who was not the kind of help mate needed.
    "About two years later, he went with his wife to visit her daughter in Crawford County some miles south of their home. This daughter had boasted that she would fix him, thinking this terrible thought. He thought that all malice had ended and remained for a visit with his wife's daughter. One day he tasted something in his coffee and put it down without drinking it all. As he put it down, he said, 'I am poisoned.' She grabbed the cup and threw it out the door
