Thanks for your pedigree chart---may I make one comment---#384--Jacob Showalter Sr. d. Apr. 1773 in penenton, Chester Co., Pa. I do not believe there is a pementon in Chester Co. This village is supposed to have got its name at the founding of the Whitehall Cement penent co property was on what was once the land of above Jacob. Taken from the History of Lehigh Co. printed in 1911. Jacob Sr. settled there on 450 acres in 1752--should say he "squatted" on it, for he never had a clear title at the time. It really belonged to one Wm. Allen, but a compromise was reached--Jacob Sr. sold \$\frac{1}{2}\$ of his interest to Allen. Jacob, on Dec. 31, 1759 sold to son Joseph, 150 A, John 150Acres, son Jacob 100 acres and son-in-law, Peter Pasler, 100 Acres. Joseph sold his land in April of 1771 and went to Chester, followed by John. Jacob Jr. left at about the same time for Bucks Co.
