Book Reviews

LaVerne Evergreen Cemetery Tombstone Inscriptions viewed and compiled by Lorraine Frantz Edwards and E. Louise Larick. (1989. 270pp. illus. \$20.00 from Lorraine Frantz Edwards, P. O. Box 2076, Lancaster, PA 93539-2076)

A transcription and history of this large cemetery also includes a 65-page every-name index with over 3,400 names. A six-page history of the cemetery that began in 1903 and an eight-page listing of veterans who served in the Confederate War, Civil War, Spanish American War, WW I, WW II, Korean War, and Vietnam War can be found.

With the benefit of numerous maps, an out-of-state researcher can pinpoint exactly where an individual is buried.

Sections of the cemetery are graphically illustrated with the area listed by row plus contiguous identification of the deceased. Photographs are used, in some cases, to document the absence of information. For example: "Father Moore and Mother Moore."

LaVerne is well-known as a Church of the Brethren community and many of the interred were members of the several Brethren churches.

The most frequent surnames include Arnold, Barnhizer, Bixby, Blickenstaff, Bradley, Brooks, Brubaker, Dailey, Davis, Hanawalt, Horning, Johns(t) on (e), Lewis, Martin, Maxwell, McClellan, Michael, Miller, Moomaw, Morris(on), Torrey, Walker, Weaver, Wheeler, White, Wolf(e), Wood(s), Wright, Yoder, Young, Zimmerman(n), and Zug.

Meticulous care and time went into the compilation of this data.

A Guide to Genealogical Resources at the Centre for Mennonite Brethren Studies, Winnipeg, Manitoba compiled by Alf Redekopp. (1989. \$10.00 in Canadian funds plus \$2.00 postage and handling from Alf Redekopp, Assistant Archivist, Centre for Mennonite Brethren Studies in Canada, 1-169 Riverton Avenue, Winnipeg, MAN R2L 2E5)

A helpful reference aid to anyone interested in the vast resources in the Centre for Mennonite Brethren Studies in Canada at Winnipeg. It begins with a background to the Mennonites in Canada, and then lists the genealogies in the library as well as in "Katie Peters Collection."

This latter collection is a wonderful collection of unpublished manuscripts ranging in length from a few pages to several hundred pages, and are, for the most part, on loose-leaf paper bound in duo-tang folders.

Some of the genealogies were copies from previously published works, but usually re-organized, with an index added, and in some instances with further information added. Some of the genealogies are the manuscripts of the published works of Katie Peters herself.

A number of the volumes are collections on a particular family name containing a number of family genealogies and family registers which may or may not be connected genealogically.

A very helpful "A Finding Aid To Genealogies in the Katie Peters Collection" lists the surnames that appear in the earliest generations of each genealogy in the Katie Peters collection. An index is also included.

Other descriptions are given to the available books, family card index, church registers, periodicals, captured German documents, map collection, diaries and letters from Russia, obituary collection, and finding aids.

Mention must be made about the file of 65,865 cards listing names, dates, birthplaces, marriages, deaths, place of residences, names of parents and children, and other comments such as emigration/immigration details and the source of the information on the card.
